This program is offered to mid-level officials at central / local governments or nonprofit organizations, who are committed to contribute to the regional vitalization through the promotion of sustainable tourism.

All the sessions will be in English and conducted in Japan.

The program starts on August 26th and ends on September 20th. Participants have to complete their preliminary assignments before coming to Japan.

JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)

The Japanese Cabinet released the Development Cooperation Charter in June 2023, which stated, "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." JICA believes that this 'Knowledge Co- Creation Program' will serve as a foundation of mutual learning process.

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For What?

Background

In association with the establishment of UNWTO in 2003, aid activities in the tourism sector that can make an important contribution to economic growth in developing countries have been conducted. Since development of tourism sector increases the number of employment and bring strong impacts to various sectors, it significantly accelerates economic development in the region.

However, the benefits have not always been provided to local people due to the "heteronomous tourism", in which big from outside have taken the leading role in tourism development and obtained the lio businesses n's share. In order to realize Inclusive Socio-Economic Development, the government, local authorities, local businesses, and communities in the area need to play their respective roles collaboratively in tourism development.

In Japan, the number of the inbound tourists reached to 10 million in 2013, and it continued to increase up to 31 million in 2019. In order to attract more domestic and international tourists, the Japan Tourism Agency (JTA) under the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism of Japan has been working on "Creating Tourist Destination (CTD)". "Creating Tourist Destination" means that wider range of stakeholders such as local governments, tourism business owners, other local business owners, farmers and community people, facilitate regional/town/community development through tourism by fully utilizing local resources in the area. JTA has been focusing its effort on the human resource capacity development for the tourism promotion to facilitate regional vitalization.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, tourism sector in Japan has been tremendously damaged due to the restriction of receiving inbound visitors. On the other hand, domestic tourism revived with overcoming the difficulties for using appropriate measures for preventing the infection of COVID-19. Currently, Japan is receiving inbound visitors again, and it is expected that both domestic and international tourism demand will increase further.

Objectives

To develop core capabilities and skills for creating and managing innovative programs to promote sustainable tourism as well as to foster community development.

Eligibility and Procedures

1. Expectations to the Applying Organizations

- (1) This course is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.
- (2) This course is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable the course to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Essential Qualifications

1) Current Duties

Mid-level officials at central / local governments or non-profit organizations, who are committed to contribute to the regional vitalization through the promotion of sustainable tourism.

2) Experience in the relevant field: More than 5 year experience at or engagement with central / local governments or non-profit organizations, in the area of tourism and/or community development.

3) Educational Background: University graduates or equivalent.

4) Language Proficiency: This program includes active participation in workshops, discussions, and presentation, which requires high competence of English ability. Therefore, participants should have a competent command of



spoken and written English which is equivalent to TOEFL iBT 90 or better. Please attach an official certificate for English ability such as TOEFL, TOEIC, etc, if available.

5) Technical Requirements :

The Government of Japan will examine applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner to be consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

The JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan) will notify the results <u>not</u><u>later than July 12th, 2024</u>.

6. Conditions for Participation

The participants of JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program are required

- (1) to strictly observe the course schedule,
- (2) not to change the air ticket (and flight class and flight schedule arranged by JICA) and lodging by the participants themselves,
- (3) to understand that leaving Japan during the course period (to return to home country, etc.) is not allowed (except for programs longer than one year),

8. Other Information

- 1. Participants who have successfully completed the program will be awarded a certificate by JICA.
- 2. For the promotion of mutual friendship, JICA Kansai encourages international exchange between JICA participants and local communities, including school and university students as a part of development education program. JICA participants are expected to contribute by attending such activities and will possibly be asked to make presentations on the society, economy and culture of their home country.

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized course cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and technologies from the West in a way that is suited to its own circumstances, Japan has developed a storehouse of knowledge not found elsewhere from unique systems of organization, administration and personnel management to such social systems as the livelihood improvement approach and governmental organization. It is not easy to apply such experiences to other countries where the circumstances differ, but the experiences can provide ideas and clues useful when devising measures to solve problems.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
