

Outline







This course aims at contributing to local tourism policy making to promote balancing development and management of cultural resources (including not only heritages and arts, but also rural villages lifestyle, community, agriculture and local food) while responding to the new types of tourism (e.g. workcation, use of ICT) amid COVID-19.

Shikoku region (18,801.73 km², 3.8 million people) consists with various type of cultural resources and nature with small islands and mountains areas but it still keeps on evolving in the view point of tourism with sustainability. Under such environment, four prefectures and municipalities in the region implement effective policies on tourism development through industry-government-academia partnership and promote specific tourism products.

This course also provides opportunities for contributing to local remaining challenges in Japan through discussing with related stakeholders and it helps broaden the participants' practical knowledge for developing their local tourism plans.

All sessions are carried out in English and ONLINE. The period of the program is from August 22nd to September 9th, 2022.

Course Capacity is basically 11 participants for 11 countries but we may afford to 2-3 participants per country.









JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)' as a New Start

In the Development Cooperation Charter which was released from the Japanese Cabinet on February 2015, it is clearly pointed out that "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." We believe that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a center of mutual learning process.

Background

Tourism has been recognized as an indispensable industry to bring benefit to various industry, which promotes regional development. In particular, tourism development making use of cultural resource that is original to each region is essential. However, the way of tourism is forced to change its style due to worldwide outbreak of COVID-19. Regional municipality is therefore required to develop effective policies for the newly way of tourism.

Eligibility and Procedures

1. Expectations from the Participating Organizations

- (1) This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Participating organizations are expected to use the project for those specific purposes.
- (2) This program is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable this course to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Essential Qualifications

- 1) Officially nominated by his / her own government.
- 2) Current Duties: be a central and local government officials of national governmental organizations working on tourism and cultural issues, local government authorities or their related organizations (Ministry of Tourism, Ministry of Culture, Cultural agencies, Tourism board, municipalities, etc.) in charge of discovering, creating, protecting, promoting cultural resources for tourism.
- 3) Experience: have practical experience of more than Five (5) years as an official, administrator, researcher and/or business person in the field of tourism, cultural issues for tourism and related areas.



- *More than middle ranking executives as a position in your organization will be the main target.
- 4) Educational Background: be a graduate of university.
- 5) Language: have a competent command of spoken and written English
- 6) Health: must be in good health, both physically and mentally, to participate in the Program in Japan. Pregnant applicants are not recommended to apply due to the potential risk of health and life issues of mother and fetus.
- 7) IT environment: Stable and Hi-Speed internet, PC (at least 3GB of vacancy), Web Camera, and Microphone are essential for your participation. This program will be delivered by Google Classroom, Zoom, Youtube. If you have any concern, please ask JICA office.

(2) Recommended Qualifications

- 1) Age: between the ages of thirty (30) and fifty (50) years, in principle.
- 2) Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment: Women are encouraged to apply for the program. JICA makes a commitment to promote gender equality and women's empowerment, providing equal opportunity for all applicants regardless of sexual orientation and gender identity.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) **Application Form:** The Application Form is available at the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan)
 - * If you have any difficulties/disabilities which require assistance, please specify necessary assistances in the Medical History (1-(d)) of the application form. It may allow us (people concerned in this course) to prepare better logistics or alternatives.
- (2) **Photocopy of Passport:** to be submitted with the application form if you possess your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it.
 - *Photocopy should include the followings:

 Name, Date of birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport number and Expire date.
- (3) **Nominee's English Score Sheet**: to be submitted with the Application Form. If you have any official documentation of English ability (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC,



IELTS) just for reference.

- (4) Inception Report: to be submitted with the Application Form. Fill in Attachment of the General Information, and submit it along with the Application Form. Inception Report is very useful for us to get information about the applicant and his/her country. Hence, basicallv.we-would-not-examine-the-application-form-without-Inception-Report-appropriately-prepared.
- Power Point presentation data based on Inception Report

<u>Only accepted applicants</u> are required to prepare power point data for short presentation during early part of this course to introduce himself/herself and share experiences or challenges among participants.

4. Procedures for Application and Selection

(1) Submission of the Application Documents¹³

Closing date for applications: Please inquire to the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan).

(After receiving applications, the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) will send them to the JICA Shikoku Center in JAPAN by July 8th, 2022)

(2) Selection¹⁴

After receiving the documents through proper channels from your government, the JICA office (or the embassy of Japan) will conduct screenings, and then forward the documents to the JICA Center in Japan. Selection will be made by the JICA Center in consultation with concerned organizations in Japan. The applying organization with the best intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection. Qualifications of applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military will be examined by the Government of Japan on a case-by-case basis, consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan, taking into consideration their duties, positions in the organization, and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

Notification of results will be made by the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) not later than <u>July 22th</u>, <u>2022</u>



5. Conditions for Attendance

The participants of KCCP are required

- (1) to strictly adhere to the program schedule (Basically 2-3 hours per day).
- (2) not to change the program topics.
- (3) to observe the rules and regulation of the JICA's copyright (We may request you some written oath for your usage of video and online contents/materials etc.)

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they belong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs and are being customized to address the specific needs of different target organizations, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan was the first non-Western country to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the core of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the "adopt and adapt" concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted and/or improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese society to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from this "adoption and adaptation" process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the



success stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is rather challenging to share with our partners this whole body of Japan's developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of "tacit knowledge," a type of knowledge that cannot fully be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vastly differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of overcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
